Michigan Grows Beans!

I was crowned Huron County Runner-up Bean Queen over 17 years ago. What an honor! Who even knew there was such a thing? There is also a Michigan Bean Queen title, and Fairgrove, MI is home of the Bean Festival that has been happening since 1947. There is much history and pride around dry edible beans in the thumb area and rightfully so. We have been growing dry edible beans in our area for many years and we are pretty good at it. Production figures only go back as far as 1911, but Michigan Farmers were growing dry beans before then.

Michigan's Great Lakes and fertile, well-drained soil in the thumb and Saginaw valley are to thank for creating a suitable climate for dry beans to thrive. In Michigan we grow eight

different varieties, black and navy being the most popular along with dark red kidney, light red kidney, white kidney, small reds, cranberry, and pinto beans.

Navy beans were all the hype in the early days. There was a time when five counties in Michigan grew 92% of the WORLD'S navy beans! In 2023 Michigan grew 1.154 Million cwt. of navy beans or about 36% of the U.S. navy beans. Which is still pretty dang awesome!

As diets and consumer preference change, we are growing more black beans. 46% of the nation's black beans came from Michigan in 2023 or about 3.09 Million cwt of beans.

"Today, roughly every third row of beans produced in Michigan are exported. Over time, our leading export partner has changed from navy beans going to England to black beans going to Mexico," states Joe Cramer, Director of the Michigan Dry Bean Commission. India, Brazil, Canada, Italy, Costa Rica, Dominican and Jamaica are other importers of Michigan dry beans.

Dry beans are a ready-to-eat product and a nutritional power house! They are high in protein, fiber, iron, potassium and folate as well as cholesterol and sodium free! It is usual to eat dry beans on rice or added into soups but there are trends leaning towards using dry bean flour as an ingredient.

Cramer explains, "Most dry beans are purchased and consumed in a can or a dry pack today: [however, there is strong consumer interest in utilizing dry beans as an ingredient to complement and/or enhance the nutrition currently offered in many of the foods we consume daily. Healthy, nutrient dense (Michigan) dry beans can be milled into flours, powders, flakes, etc. and added to recipes for snacks, deserts, cereals, breading, energy bars, smoothies, etc. to significantly increase the consumption of protein, fiber, etc. Any place that you use wheat flour, dry beans can be included. If gluten is an issue, dry bean flour is a healthy, affordable option."

Spring planting is right around the corner! Come June, you will see dry beans being planted around Huron County. Now hopefully you know a little more about Michigan beans! ~

Dispatchers

I most certainly hope everyone is enjoying the beautiful weather we have been having! It sure doesn't seem like March but the calendar says it is so it must be true!! I guess we can get our spring cleaning done a little earlier this year!

This month I have an incredibly special article in store for you, and I am excited about it! I want to highlight the diligent men and women on the other end of the 911 line. That's right, our Huron County Emergency Dispatchers!! Emergency dispatchers are the unsung heroes who play a critical role in our safety and well-being. These resolute professionals are the first point of contact when we dial 911, connecting us to the help we need during emergencies.

Emergency dispatchers, also known as call-takers or telecommunicators, are the lifeline for both emergency responders and the public. They manage 911 calls, dispatch emergency services, and provide crucial information to callers. Without ever seeing the patient or the scene, these dispatchers must identify the complaint, assess the severity, and offer pre-arrival instructions. Dispatchers often work in pairs of two, which seems like it would be easy. However, at times they are managing multiple police matters and talking to someone through CPR at the same time. Or they may be lining up transfers for the ambulance services all while managing a major fire incident. On occasion, they may counsel someone who may be thinking about hurting themselves or others until further help can get there. They can take vital information and communicate it instantly to the proper emergency service. They do all this while keeping themselves cool, calm, and collected and keeping the person on the other end of the line calm as well. It takes a lot of patience and compassion to manage these stressful tasks.

Sometimes fire departments need more resources and the dispatchers help get them for us. It is not uncommon at a structure fire that we would need the power and gas shut off. The dispatchers save the day by getting the right utility company to the scene to handle it. It could be a tow wrecker that would be needed at an accident scene, they take care of that too. At times fire departments need additional resources such as more manpower from a neighboring department, another ambulance to help care for people, a police officer to help with a civil or criminal matter, and at times a fire department or ambulance service may need a life flight from one of the helicopter services in the state, they contact them too. From time to time, we may need help from the Huron County Road Commission; well they take care of that too. As you can see, a dispatcher can take your 911 call and get the right emergency service to come to you for help, but they also provide support for that emergency service as well.

It takes a special person to be a dispatcher. It is stressful and demanding at times, but it must be awfully rewarding when everything can come together, and you can turn someone's day around. Training to become a dispatcher is no easy task. There are many hours behind the counsel learning how to talk to someone in distress, what buttons to push, how to mute one call to take another, how to page multiple agencies and services at one time. Did I mention you have to know the coverage area of each fire department and ambulance service, so the proper department is called? It also takes a lot of formal training as well. This includes taking classes and attending training courses. These courses include stress reduction, communication between individuals, radio communication, phone skills, public health and safety, emergency liability, suicide prevention, abuse, and homeland security.

Emergency dispatchers are the true first responders, bridging the gap between callers and help. Their expertise, compassion, and adherence to protocols save lives every day. I have the utmost respect for our dispatchers. Our dispatchers do a wonderful job, and we should all be thankful to have them! April 14-20, 2024 is 911 Telecommunication Appreciation week, if you know a dispatcher, please make sure you thank them for their selfless service to our community. As we dial 911, let us remember the dedicated voices on the other end—the unsung heroes who keep us safe when seconds count. ~





My success rate is off the charts!!!

With a new game appearing every 24 hours, beginning at 12:00 AM and terminating at 11:59 PM that same day, one must always make time for Wordle.

Some will lie there in bed, fighting sleep, breathlessly waiting for that deliberately slow-moving alarm clock to jump to 12 midnight. Boom! It's time! Instantaneously, Wordle is called up, the first word is inserted, and an alternating sadness and euphoria kicks in until finally a correct answer is achieved. Ideally, one's efforts result in a score of one (seldom), two, three, or four. If so, one turns off his device and goes peacefully to sleep, secure in the knowledge that he is indeed a Word Master for yet another day. Conversely, a score of five or six will leave him exhaling deeply, somewhat disappointed in his performance, but yet satisfied that his streak of success moves on to live another day. I do not present these statistics to brag (though I must admit I'm pretty proud), but to give readers an idea as to what is involved and the records that are available daily at your fingertips.



Josh Wardle, a Welsh software engineer employed by Reddit, developed the game so that he and his partner, Palak Shah, could enjoy a new diversion during COVID. In October 2021 he decided to post the game on his website, changing one letter in his name and calling it WORDLE. Within two months, it had attracted over a half million players. Not looking to make the game his life's work, he accepted a seven-figure offer by The New York Times to take it off his hands in January 2022, and countless players across the world have since become obsessed with it.

If I have not scared you off, give Wordle a try. As I grow older, it has reinforced in my mind that my mental skills have not totally abandoned me!

STATE OF MICHIGAN COUNTY OF HURON VILLAGE OF PORT AUSTIN

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AN ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE THE OPERATION OF GOLF CARTS ON VILLAGE STREETS PURSUANT TO MCL 257.657a; TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS HEREOF AND TO REPEAL ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH

THE VILLAGE OF PORT AUSTIN ORDAINS:

Section 1. Definitions.

"Golf Cart" – A vehicle specifically designed and intended for the purposes of transporting one or more persons and their golf clubs or maintenance equipment while engaged in the playing of golf, supervising the play of golf, or maintaining the condition of the grounds on a public or private golf course.

"Village Streets" – Any of the streets within the boundaries of the Village of Port Austin, Michigan, except for state and county roads.

Section 2. Policy Statement.

This Ordinance is adopted in the interest of public safety. Golf carts are not designed or manufactured to be used on public streets and roads, hereinafter "streets(s)," and the Village of Port Austin in no way advocates or endorses their operation on streets. The Village, by regulating such operation is merely addressing safety issues. This Ordinance is not to be relied upon as determination that operation on streets is safe or advisable even if done in accordance with this Ordinance.

All persons operating golf carts must be observant of, and attentive to the safety of themselves and others, including their passengers, other motorists, bicyclists, and pedestrians. All persons who operate or ride golf carts on streets inside the Village of Port Austin do so at their own risk and peril. The Village is immune from tort liability for injuries or damages sustained by any person arising in any way out of the operation of use of a golf cart on maintained or unmaintained streets, shoulders, and rights-of-way over which the Village has jurisdiction.

Section 3. Operation of Golf Carts.

A person may operate a golf cart on streets within the Village of Port Austin, subject to the following restrictions:

A person shall not operate a golf cart unless he or she is at least 16 years old and licensed to operate a motor vehicle.

The operator of a golf cart shall comply with all signaling requirements of MCL 257.648, as amended, that apply to the operation of a vehicle. Either hand signals or mechanical signals shall be permitted.

A person operating a golf cart upon a roadway shall ride as near to the right side of the roadway as practicable, exercising due care when passing a standing vehicle or one proceeding in the same direction.

A person shall not operate a golf cart on a state trunk line highway. This subsection does not prohibit a person from crossing a state trunk line highway when operating a golf cart on a village street, using the most direct line of crossing.

Where a usable and designated path for golf carts is provided adjacent to a highway or street, a person operating a golf cart shall be required to use that path.

A person operating a golf cart shall not pass between lines of traffic, but may pass on the left of traffic moving in his or her direction in the case of a two-way street or on the left or right of traffic in the case of a one-way street, in an unoccupied lane.

A golf cart shall not be operated on a sidewalk constructed for the use of pedestrians.

A golf cart shall be operated at a speed not to exceed 15 miles per hour and shall not be operated on a highway or street with a speed limit of more than 30 miles per hours except to cross that highway or street.

A golf cart shall not be operated on village streets during the time period from one half (1/2) hour before sunset to one half (1/2) hour after sunrise, unless equipped with mechanical signals and headlights.

A person operating a golf cart or who is a passenger in a golf cart is not required to wear a crash helmet.

No person under the age of 4 years shall be a passenger of a golf cart operate on village streets.

Any person operating a golf cart or who is a passenger in a golf cart shall wear a properly adjusted and fastened safety belt as required by MCL 257.710e for operators and passengers of motor vehicles.

No person shall operate a golf cart while under the influence of alcohol or a controlled substance.

No person shall operate a golf cart while holding or using a mobile electronic device as those terms are defined in the Michigan Vehicle Code, Public Act 300 of 1949, as amended.

This ordinance does not apply to a police officer in the performance of his or her official duties.

Prior to operation on any village street, all golf carts intended for street use within the Village shall be registered with the Port Austin Police Department. Proof of registration as provided by the Village shall be prominently displayed on the rear of any golf cart operated on village streets.

Section 4. Enforcement.

Any person who is found to be in violation of this ordinance shall be guilty of a municipal civil infraction and shall be ordered to pay a civil fine of not less than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars. A court of competent jurisdiction may order a person who causes damage to the environment, a street, or other property as a result of the operation of a golf cart to pay full restitution in addition to the penalties paid for civil fines.

Section 5. Severability.

The various parts, sections, and clauses of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be severable. If any part, sentence, paragraph, section, or clause is adjudged unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of the Ordinance shall not be affected thereby.


Section 6. Effective Date.

Three years ago, following the death of baseball great Hank Aaron, I wrote an article for The Port Austin News about the amazing turn of events that put my lifetime friend and former Port Austin neighbor Stan Prokop and me in Atlanta's Fulton County Stadium on Monday night, April 8, 1974. It was there that we witnessed arguably the greatest happening in the history of baseball, before or since – Hank Aaron passing Babe Ruth on the all-time home run list by belting #715 against Los Angeles Dodgers pitcher Al Downing. The reason I am bringing this up is because April 8 of 2024, just a few weeks away, marks the 50th anniversary of this historic event.
